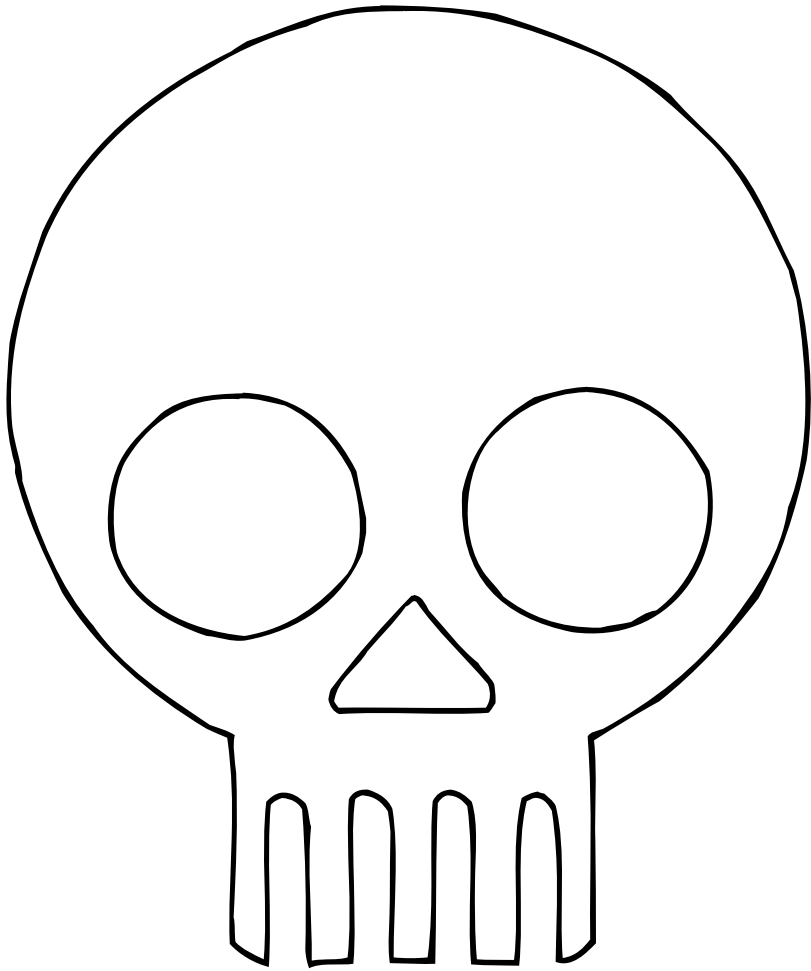
Make your own pirate flag by using the shapes provided.

Cut out two long shapes for the cross bones.

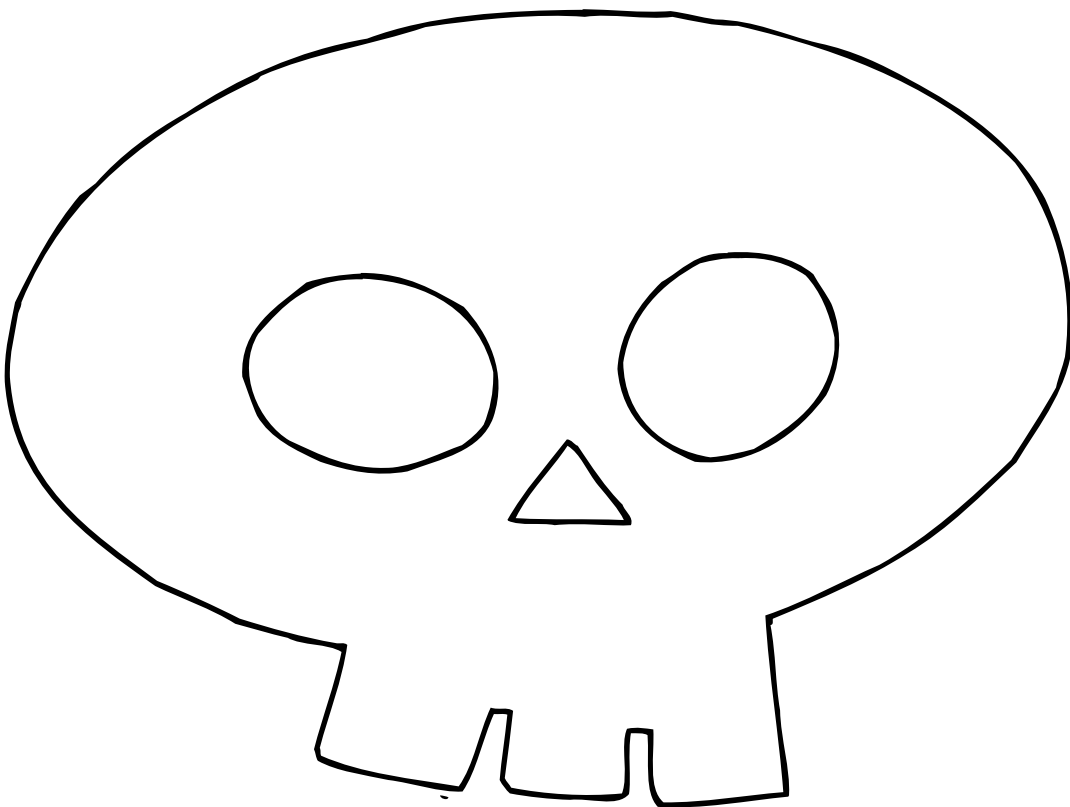
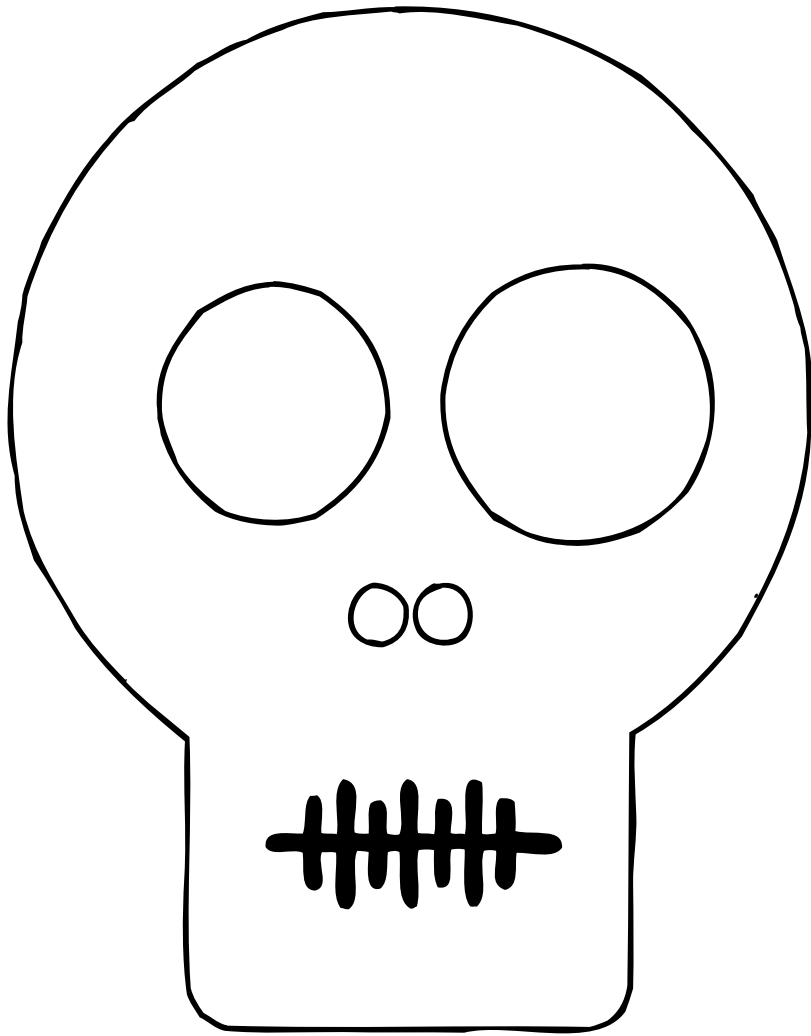


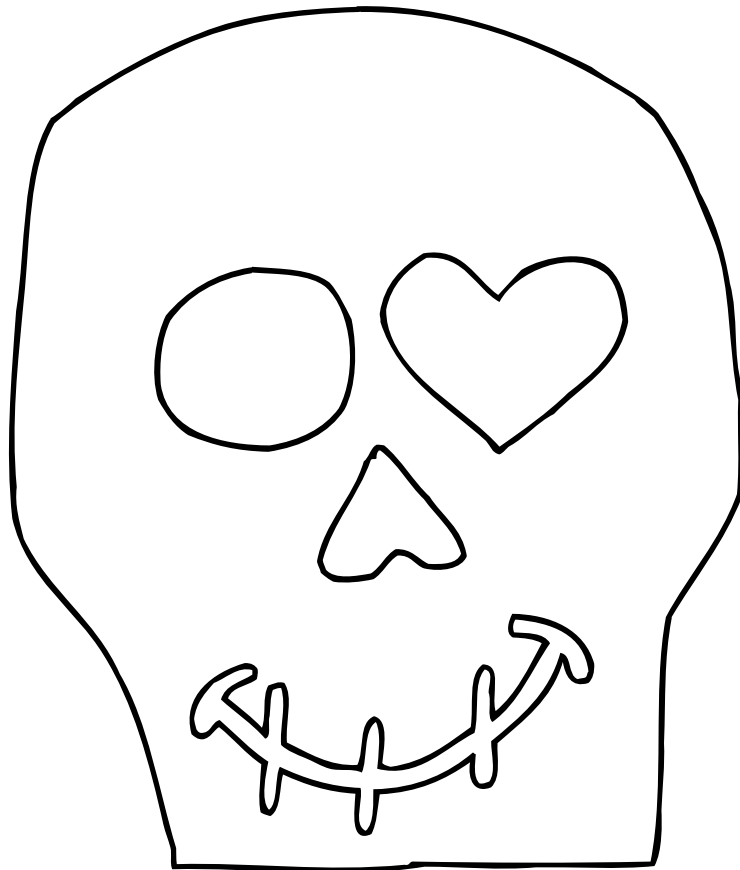
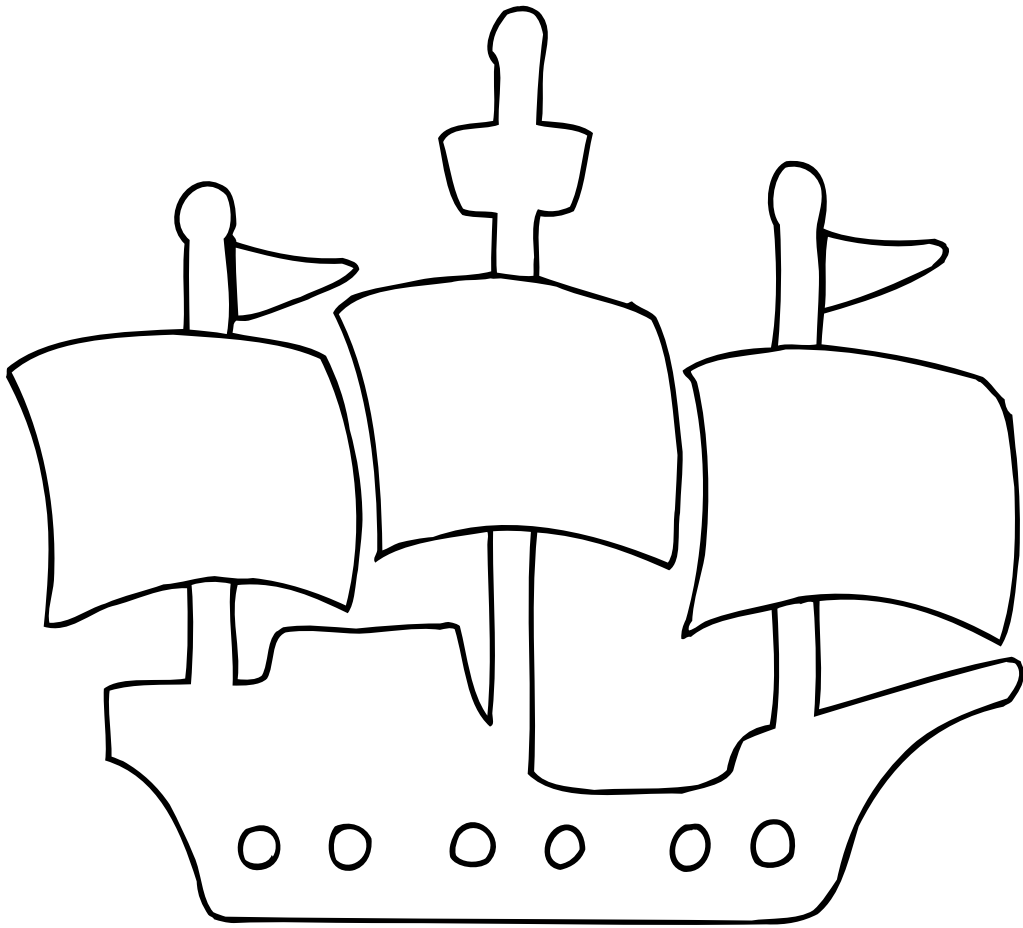

Cut wavy edges around the flag.

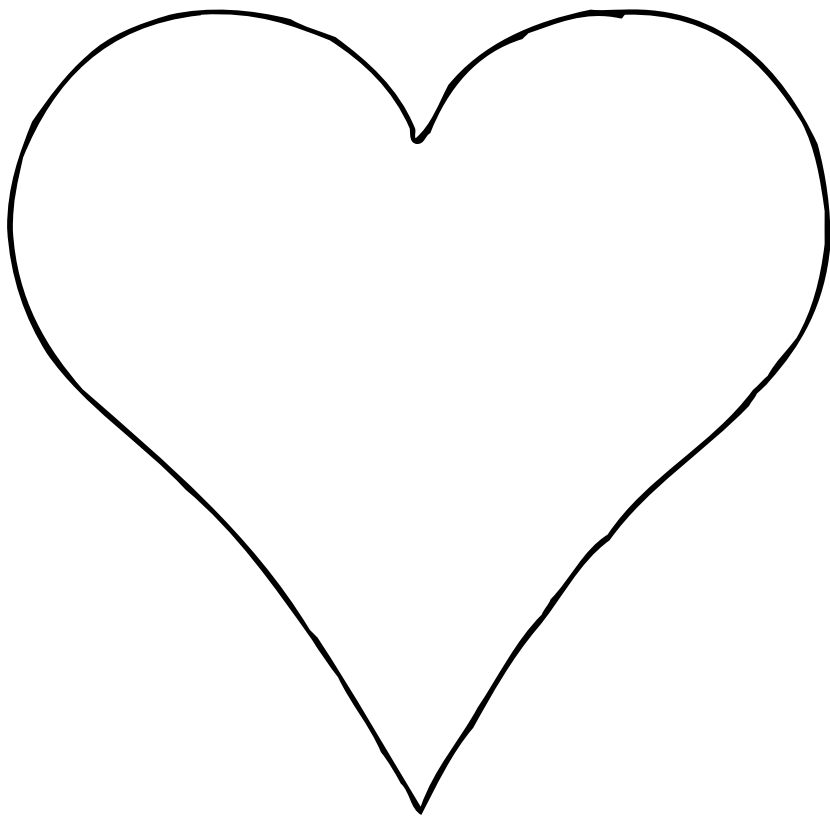
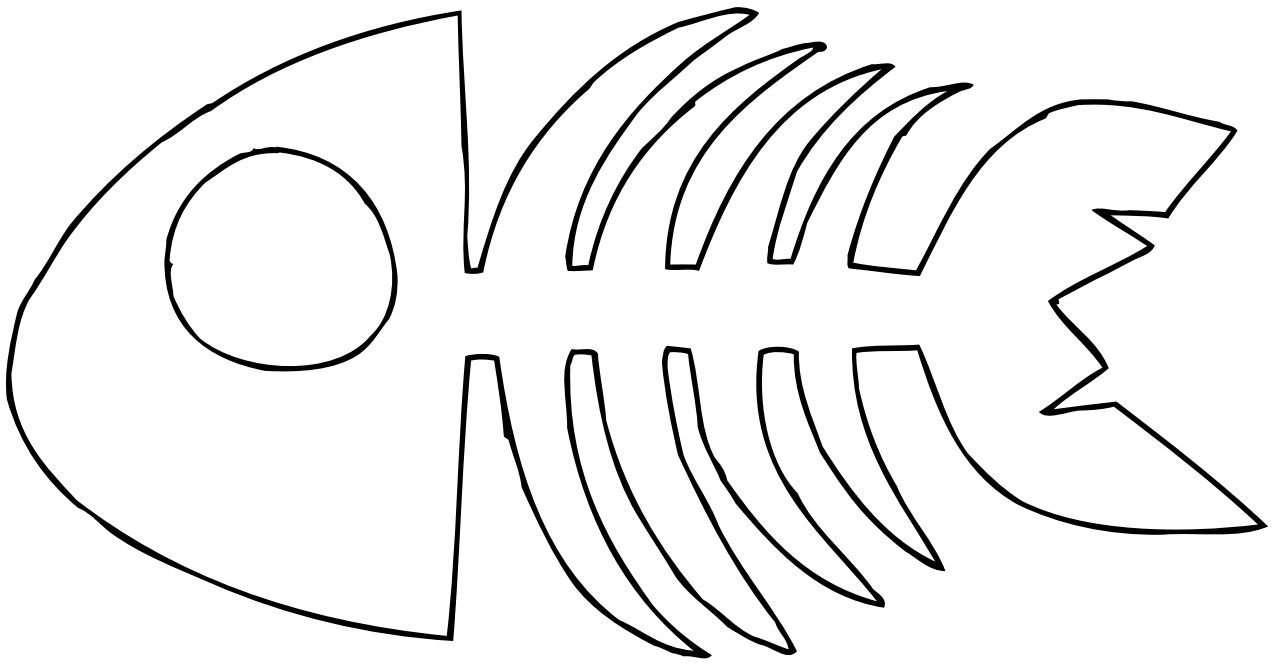


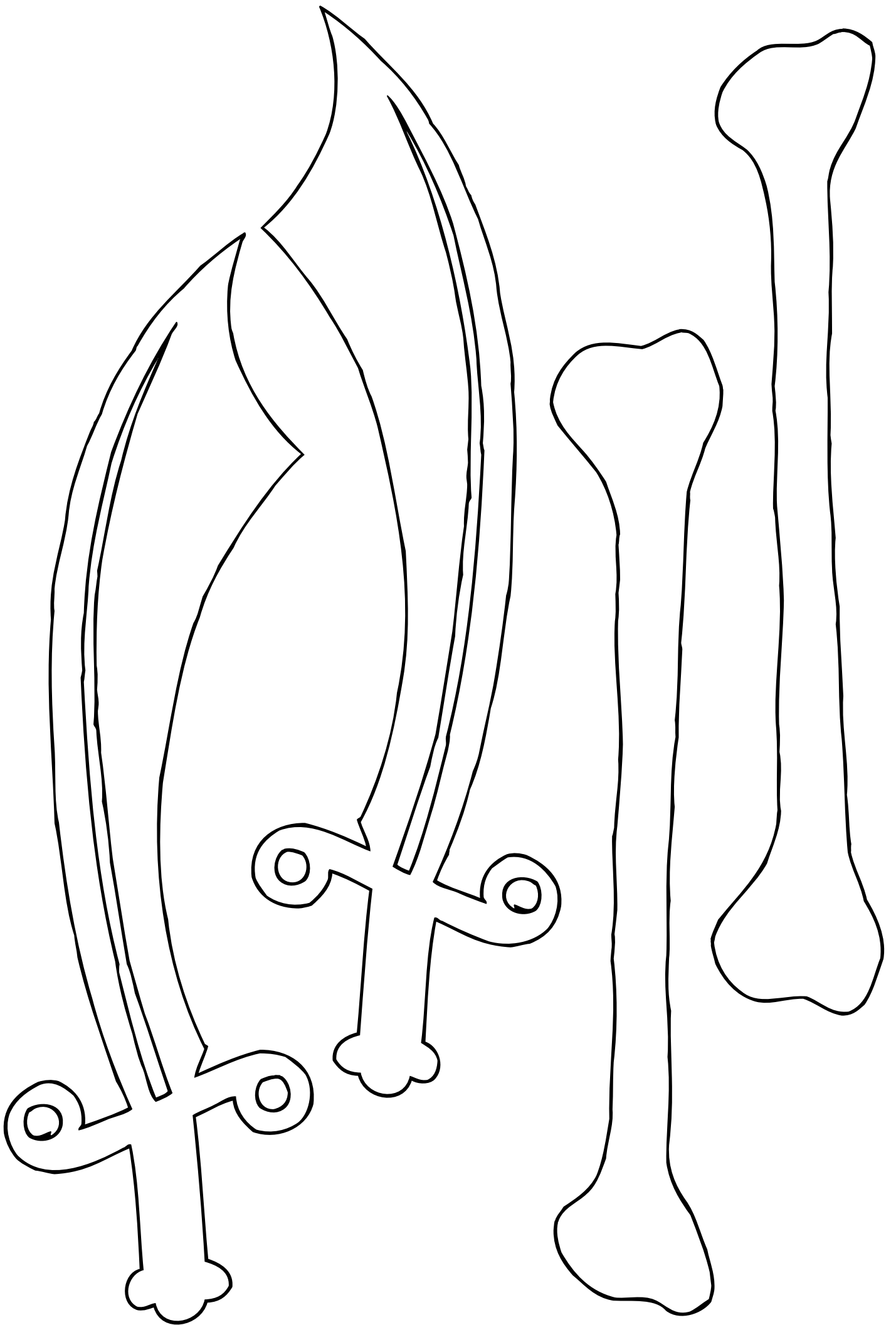


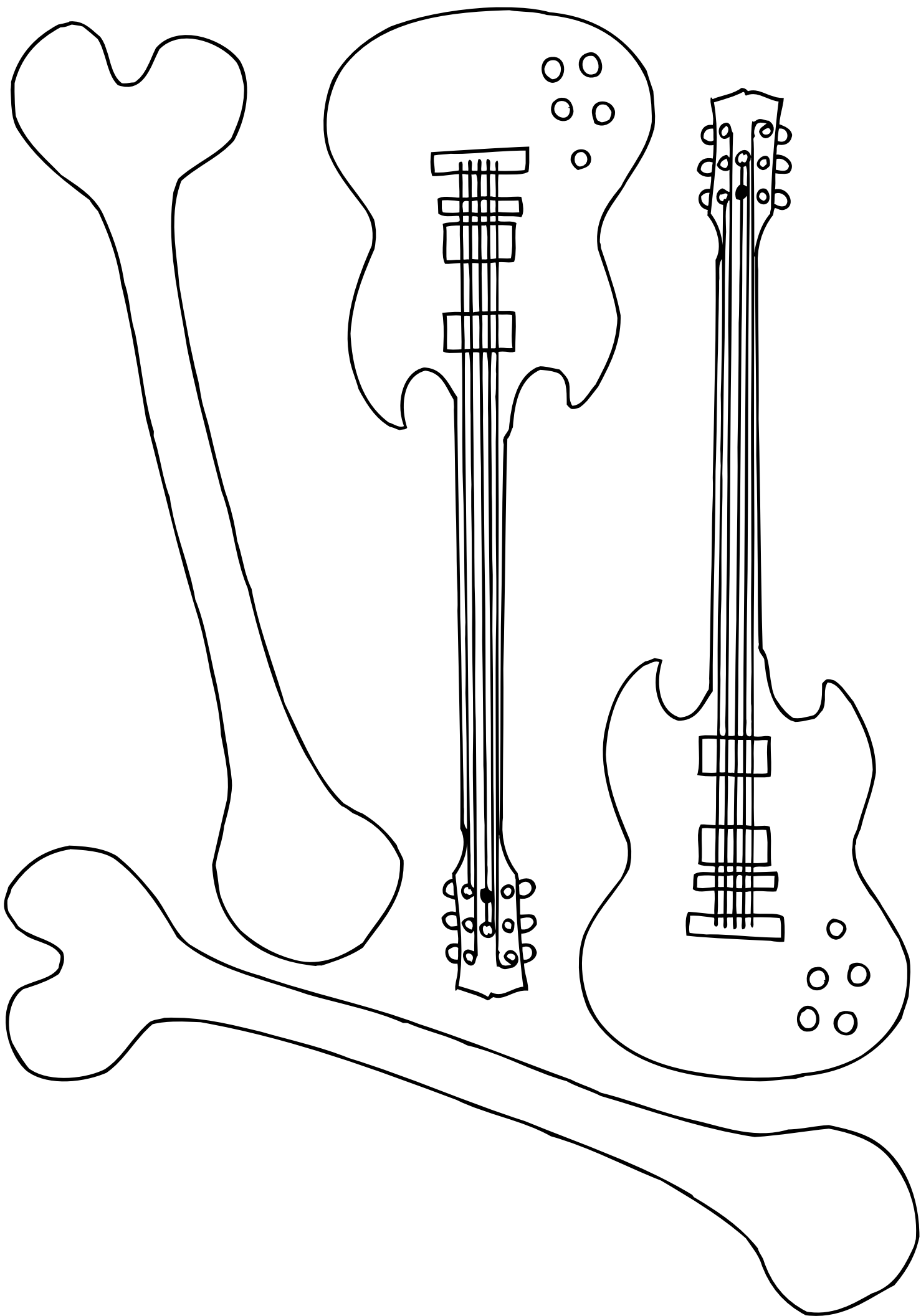




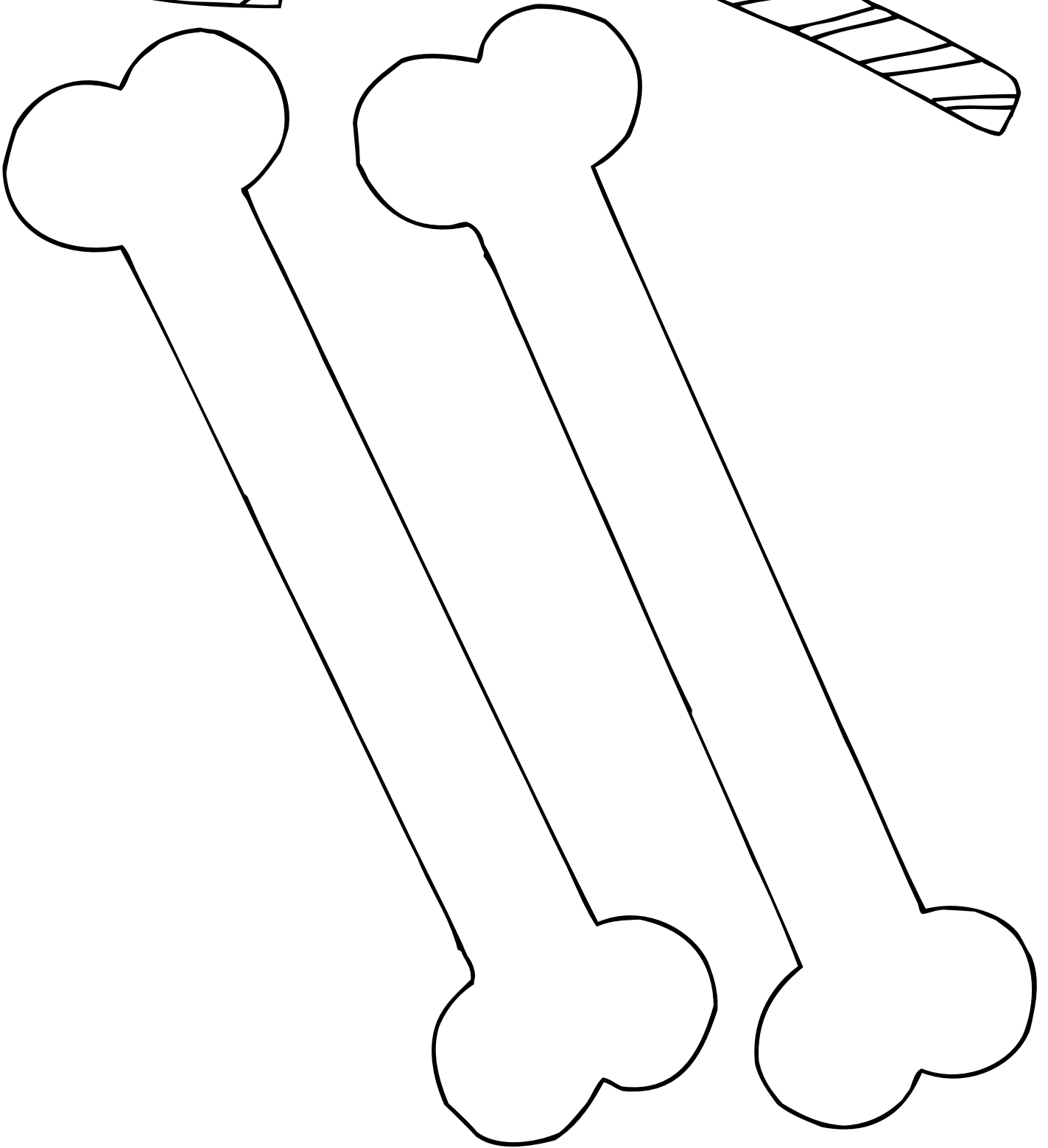
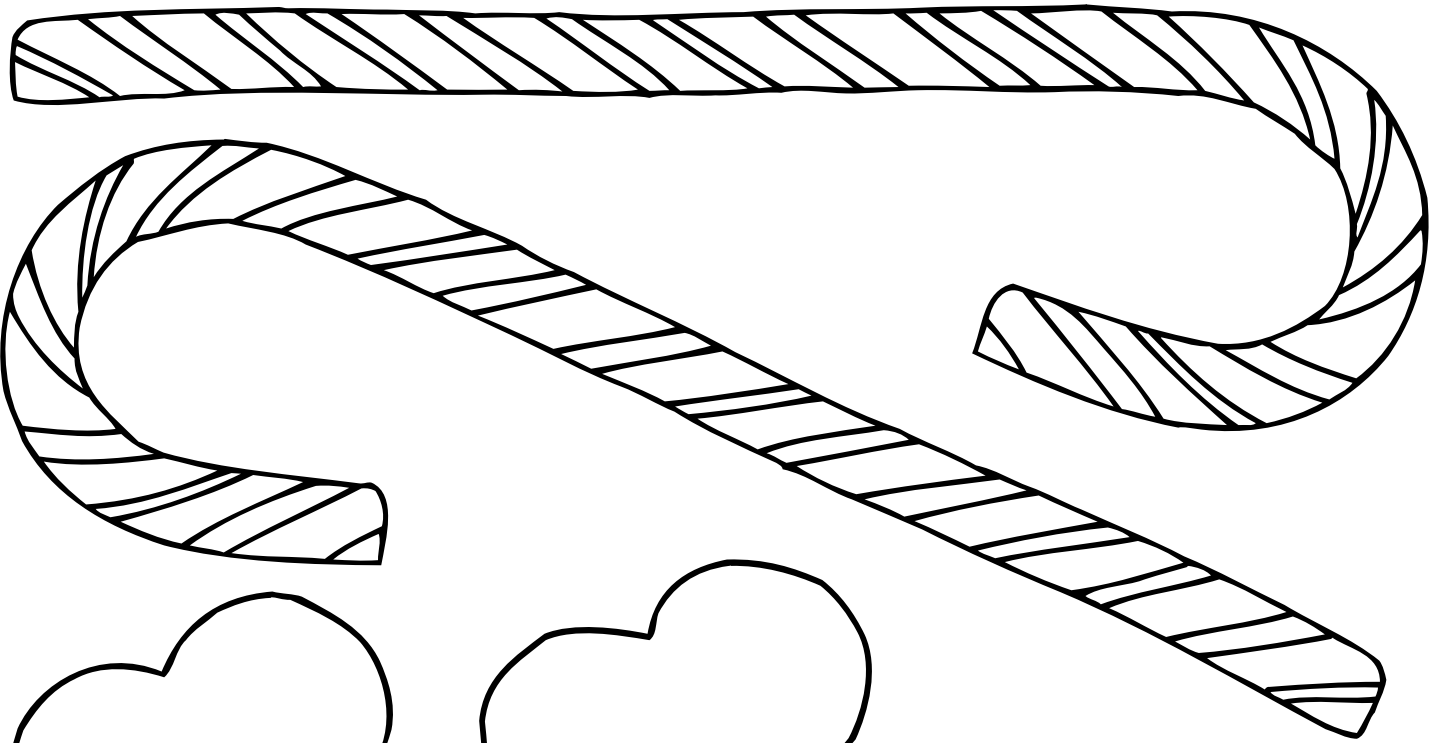


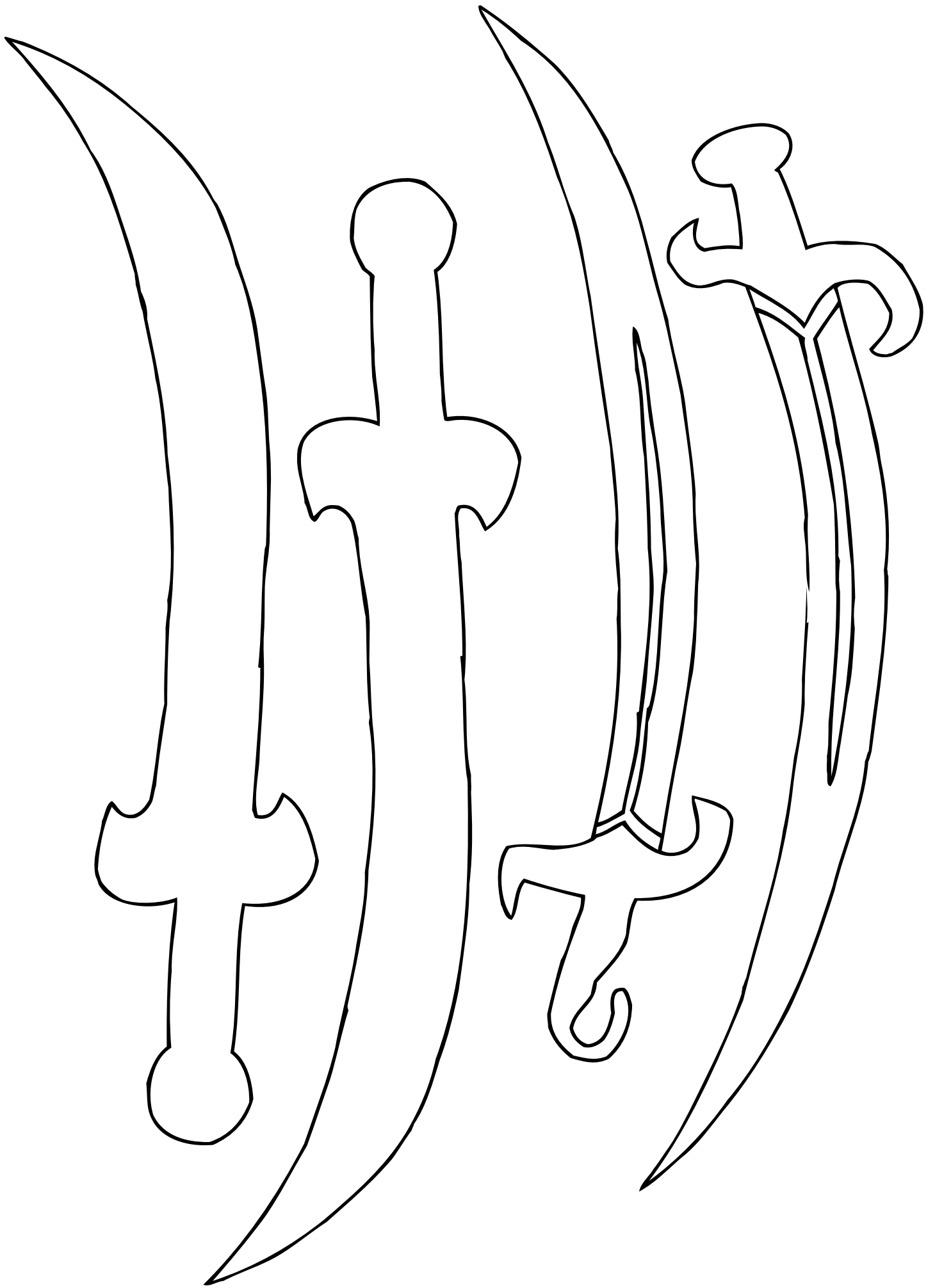


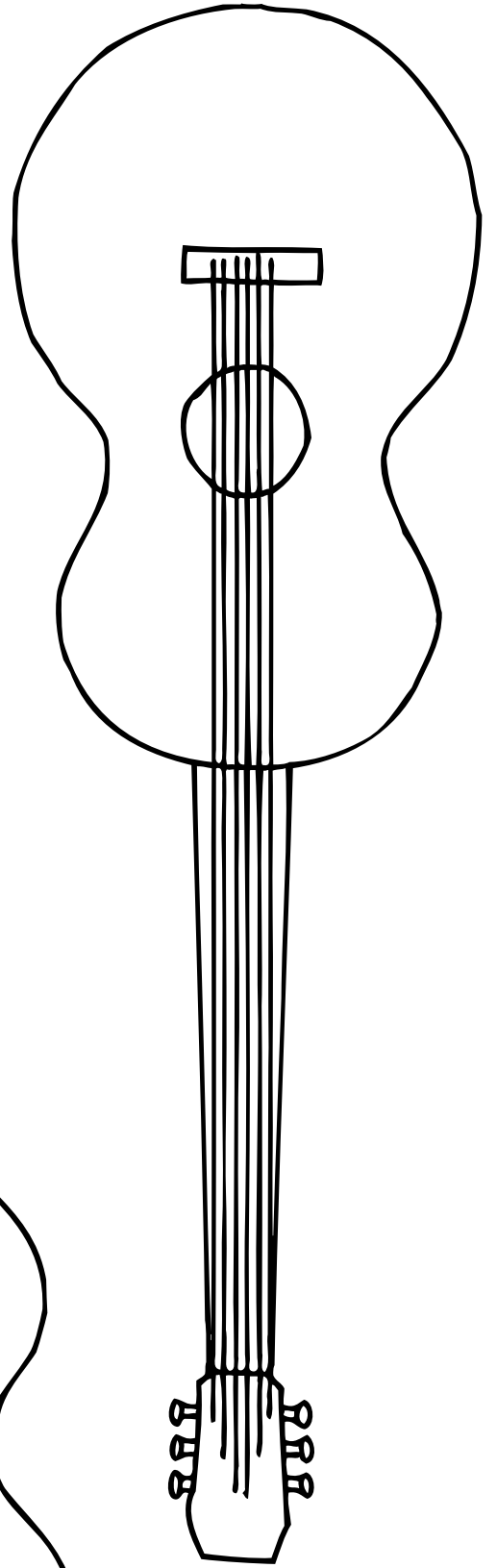
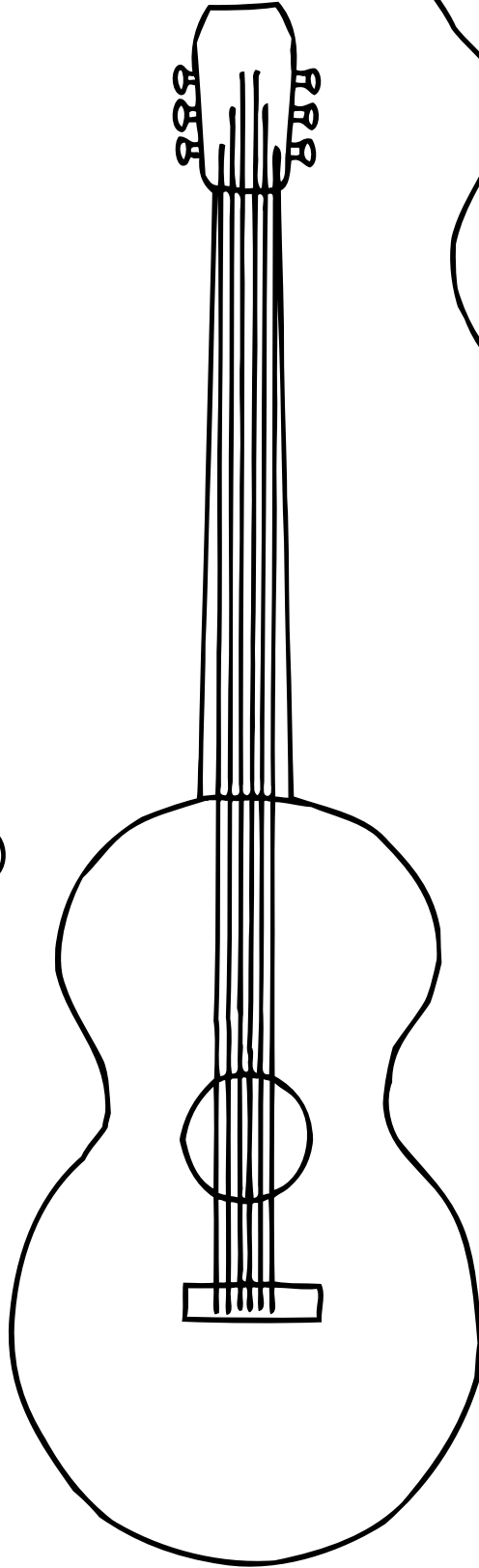
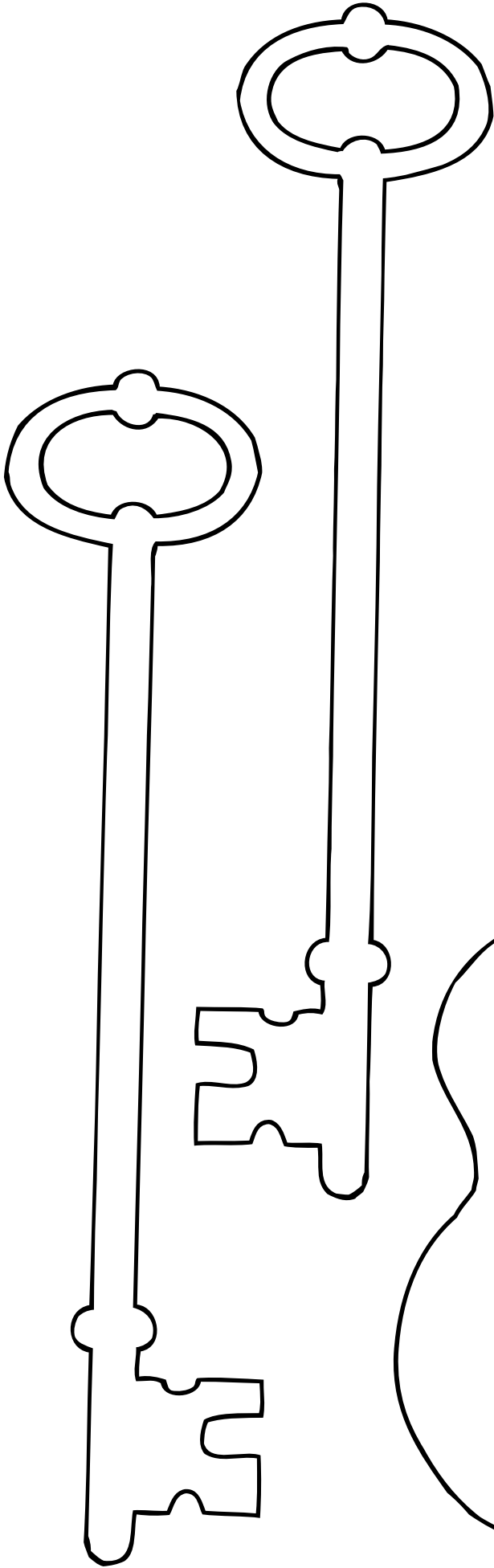












TREASURE MAP

Start at the bottom of an A3 sheet of paper and place a tile with a dotted black line.

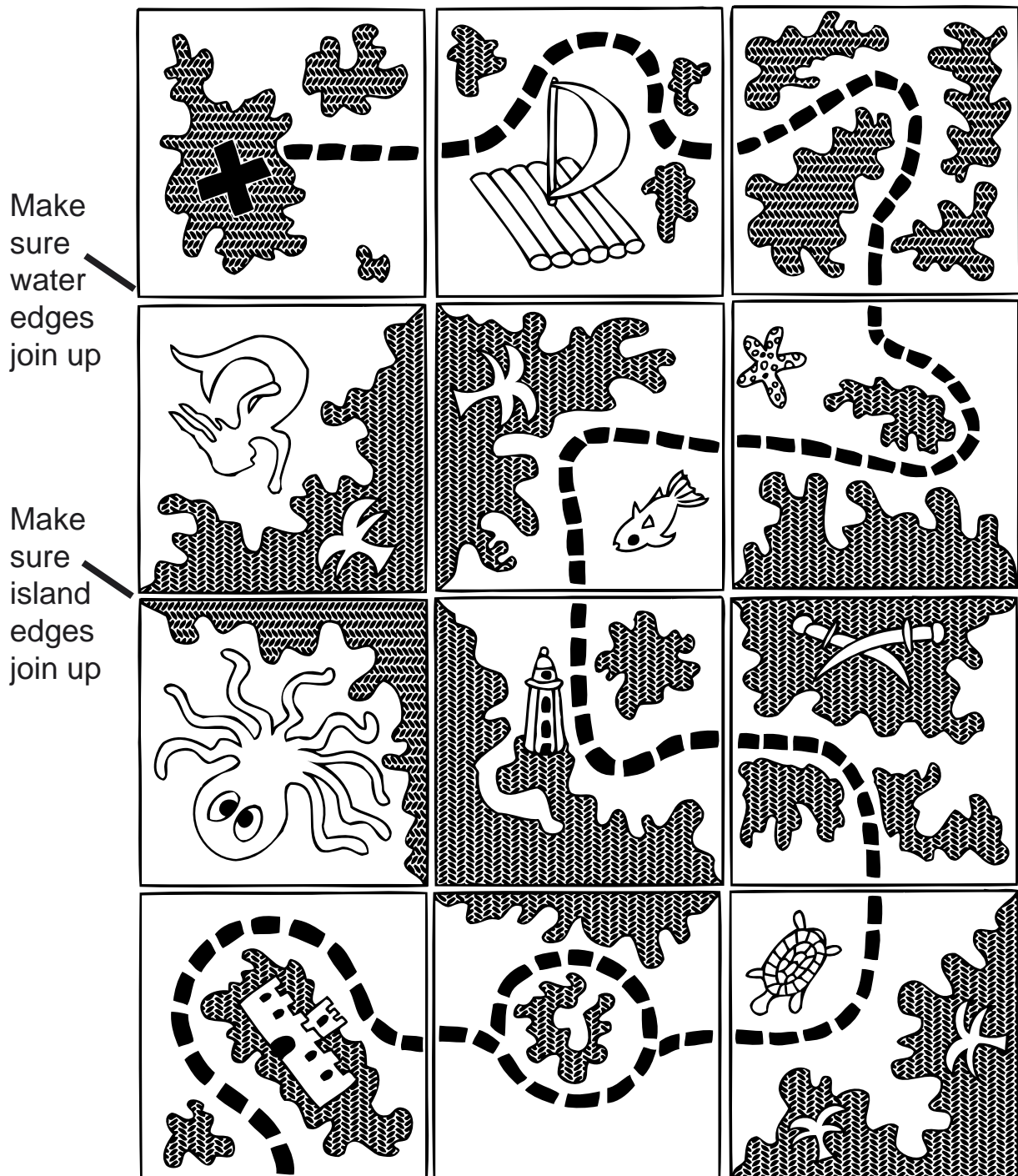
Continue adding tiles by joining the dotted black line.

Make sure the ocean edges join with other ocean edges and the land joins to land.

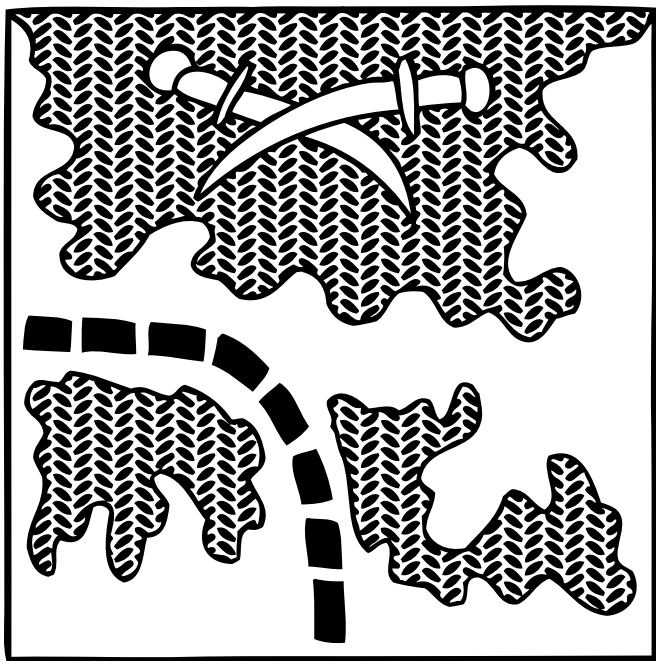
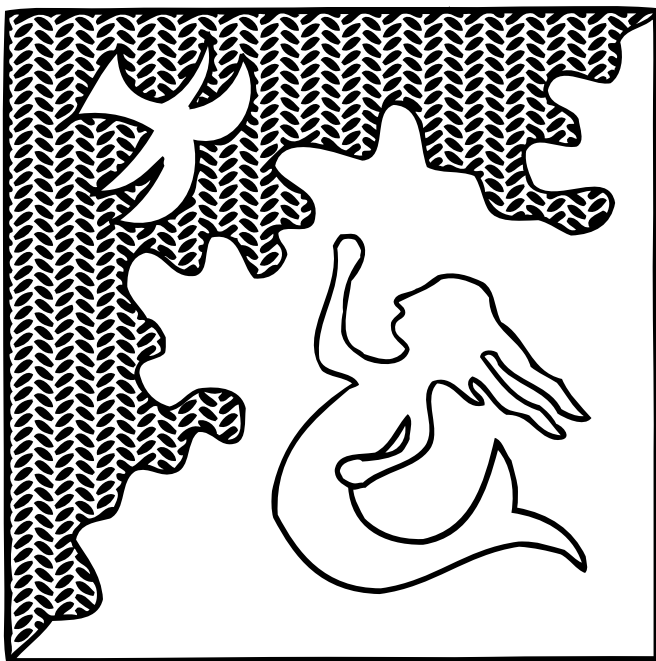
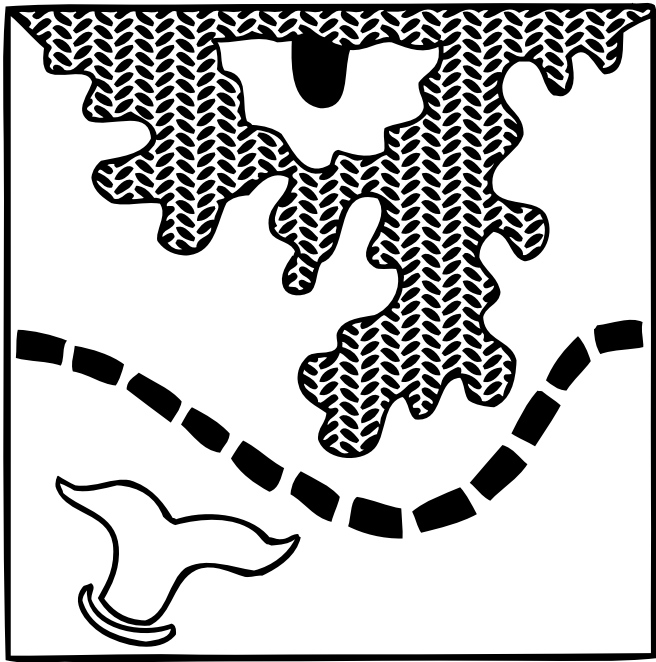
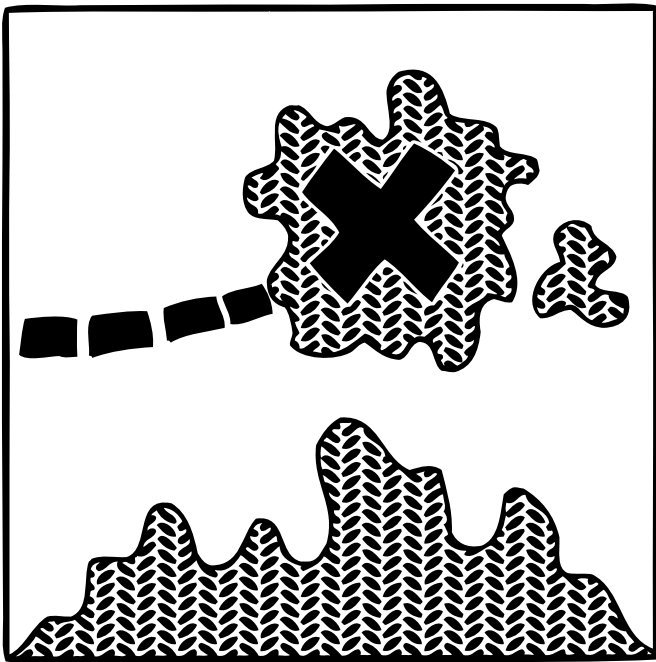
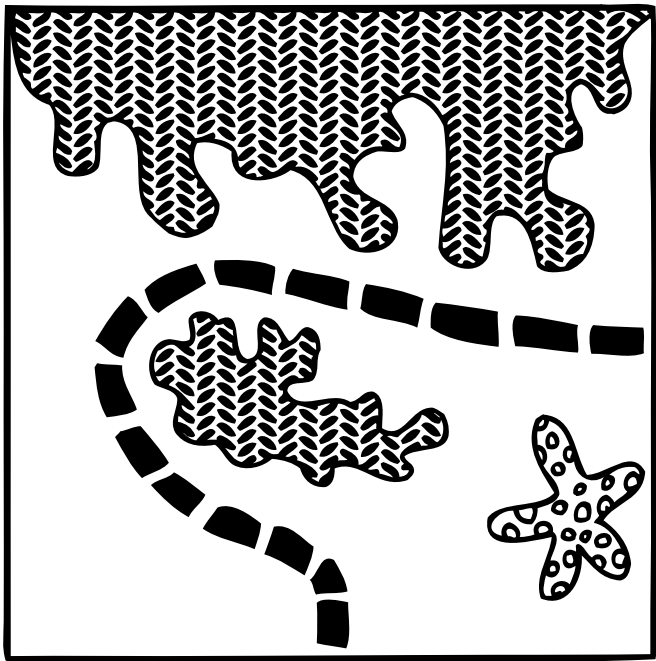
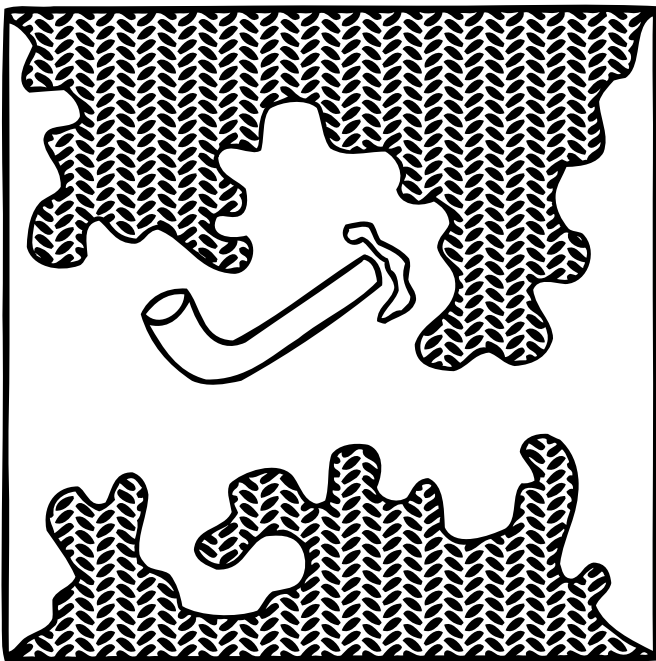
Finish the red line whenever you want by adding a treasure island (X marks the spot).

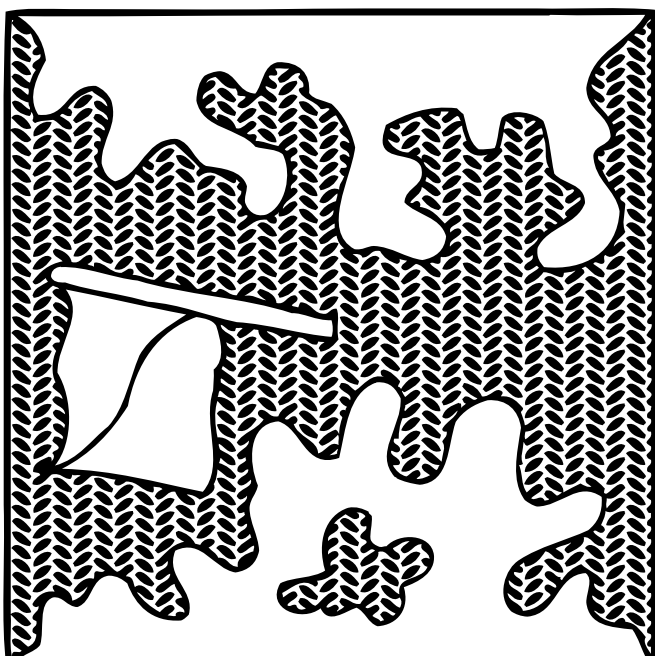
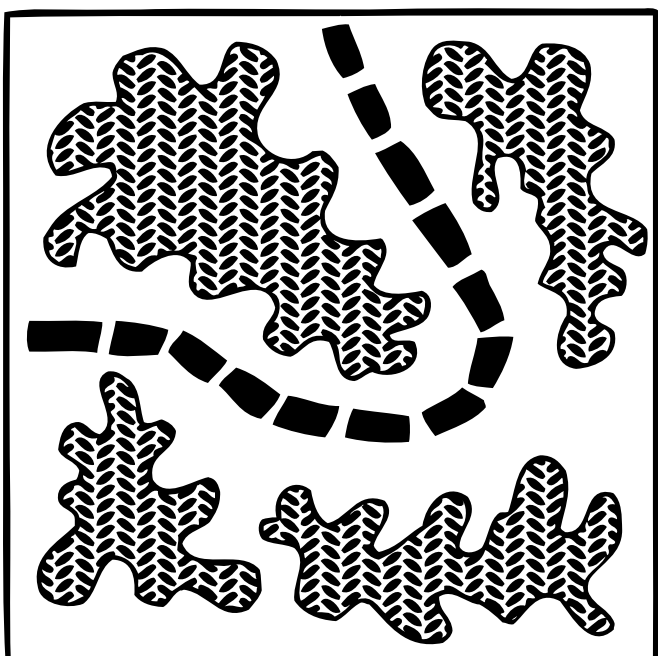
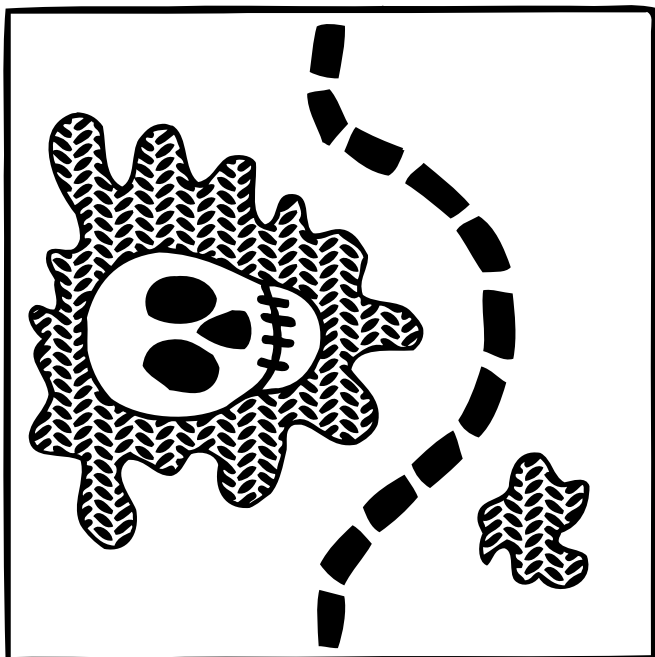
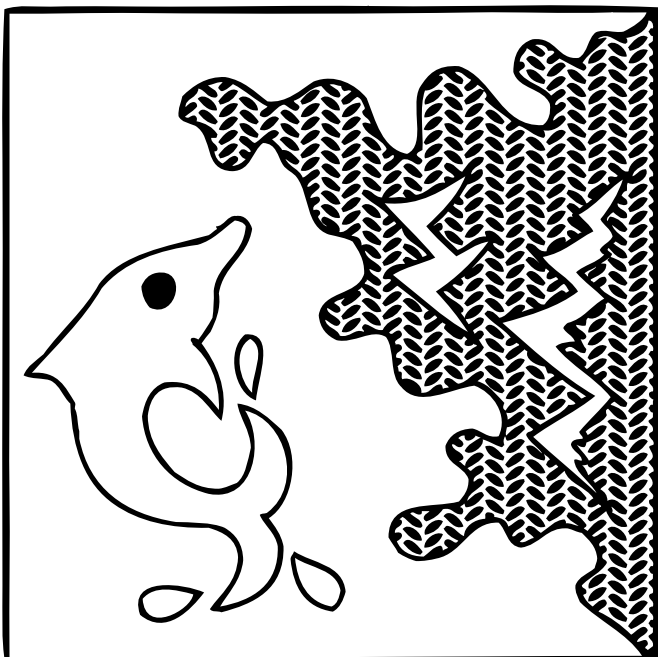
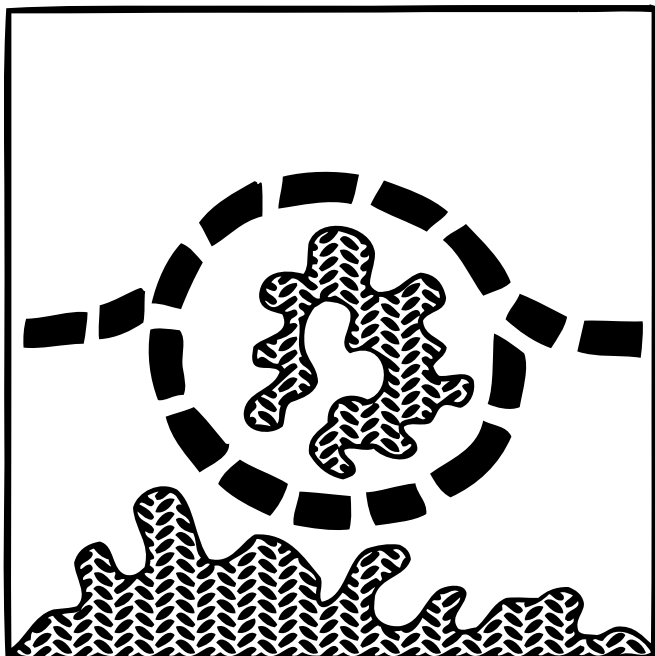
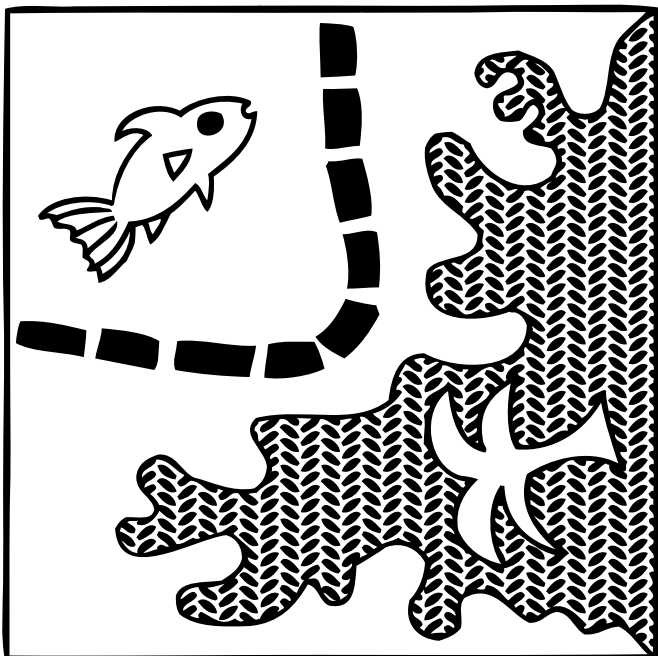

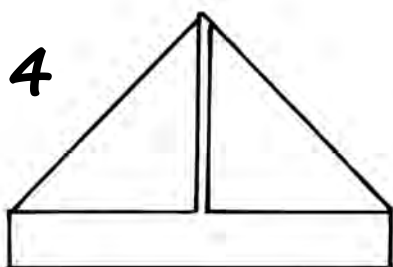
Start with a piece of newspaper



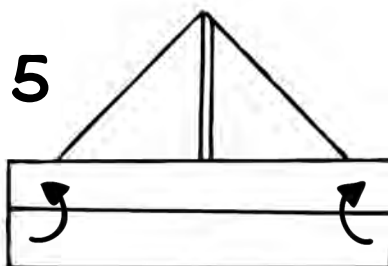
Fold the paper in half



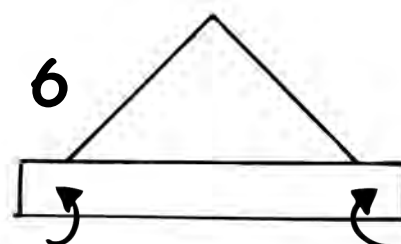
Fold the top corners down towards the center of the page



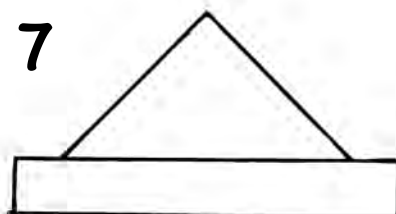
Your paper should look like this

Pieces of eight: Silver coins that can be broken into eight pieces

Plunder: Treasure taken from others

Privateer: A pirate officially sanctioned by a national power

Wastrel: A useless man

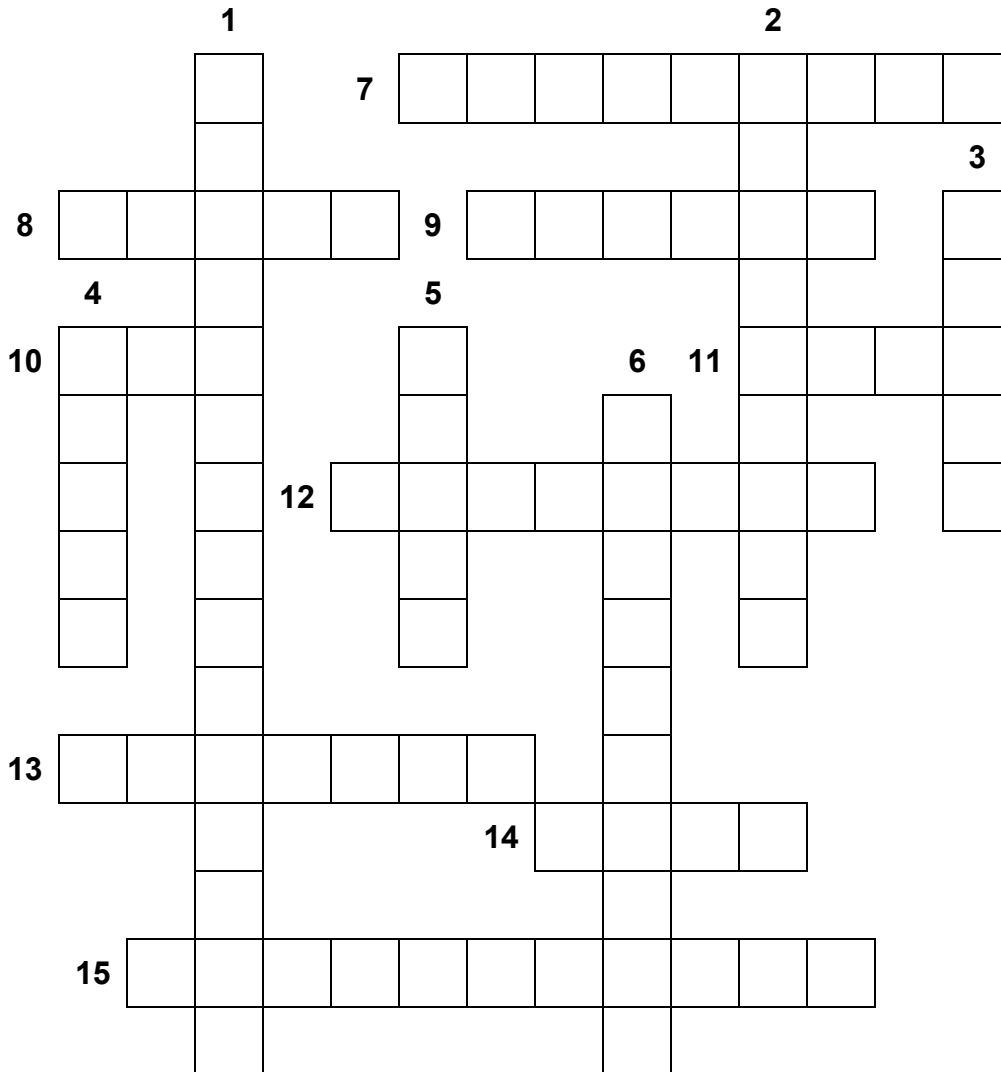
